Course Description/Learning Outcomes:

The course will introduce legal concepts that will enrich the understanding of business principles and concepts critical to the success of managers in finance, marketing, communications, accounting or pure economics, including principles and concepts critical to success on the CPA Examination, and an appreciation of the importance of ethics in business.

Current cases will be used to illustrate helpful legal principles and how the court system decides relevant disputes. The Internet and intellectual property will be emphasized including cybercrimes such as credit card fraud, hacking, and identity theft, as well as the difficulty of prosecuting such criminals, especially when they reside overseas. Employment issues and discrimination law such as immigration status, or constructive discharge, and the many forms of possible discrimination will be addressed, by means of current cases. International law will be discussed as it relates to management and comparisons with USA laws will explore and highlight the basic concepts that guide commerce. The method will be use of thought provoking queries that will apply the concepts found, and provide an understanding and the ethical context in which business decisions must be made, in order to succeed in the legal environment.
